### History and dates of Flagging, Locustwood, Memorial Day and Legion Statewide Services

In 1932, the Locustwood Cemetery Association deeded 400 free grave sites to the American Legion for use by Legionnaires and their spouses, and erected a monument memorializing their service.

As part of the transfer of grave sites, the American Legion committed to holding an annual memorial on the first Sunday after Memorial Day, a tradition that has continued since 1935 !! (Annual NJ American Legion Statewide).

Keeping with this tradition, American Legion Post 372 members gather on the Sunday prior to Memorial Day weekend, in preparation of Memorial Day and Statewide Services, to honor and remember our veterans (and fellow Legionnaires) by placing American Flags on all the veterans graves. (Annual Flagging of Locustwood)

The following week, on Memorial Day, American Legion holds Services at our Legion, Locustwood, Cooper River, and attends the Cherry Hill Township Services. NJ American Legion Statewide Services, which are held on the Sunday after Memorial Day in front of the American Legion monument at Locustwood Cemetery, brings NJ American Legion Officers, Honor Guards and members from Legions throughout the state of New Jersey for a parade and service. Local dignitaries and other veteran organization representatives are among the speakers and guests as well. Following the Service at Locustwood, American Legion Post 372 has a Social/Food Buffet at the Legion.

These events/traditions have deep roots which include a commitment to fulfill a promise made between NJ American Legion and Locustwood some 89 years ago.

# A Little History of High Point:

The monument was built through the generosity of Colonel Anthony R. and Susie Dryden Kuser from Bernardsville, NJ, who also donated the land for High Point State Park, in honor of all New Jersey war veterans. Construction was started in 1928 and completed in 1930.

High Point State Park was dedicated in 1923 as the first State Park in New Jersey. With 14,218 acres of woodland on Kittatinny Mountain, it includes the state's first Natural Area, the Dryden Kuser Natural Area, the highest elevation cedar swamp of its kind in the world. Lake Marcia, a 20-acre glacial lake has a beach with lifeguards, bathhouse and food. In winter it's converted to a cross-country ski center. <u>High Point Monument</u> was built in 1930 and is dedicated to New Jersey's wartime heroes. The park was designed so that all land to the south of Route 23 North has overnight facilities, such as camping, and day activities are conducted on the north side, such as swimming and day hikes. There are over 50 miles of trails, including Monument Trail. There are cabins at Steenykill Lake and campsites at Sawmill Lake. There's fishing, boating, skating, picnicking, hiking, skiing, hunting, and the Appalachian Trail.

A drive for the weekend or day in the fall is a must, when the glories of High Point are at their height. As you near the top of Kittatinny Ridge on Route 23 North, the park office is on the left. Stop in for maps of trails and roads and good info from the staff before continuing into the park.

# Celebrating our nation's 248<sup>th</sup> Birthday



At 11am on July 4, as inhabitants of Belleville did 227 years ago, we gathered at the Dutch Reform Church to honor those who fought and lost their lives in the Revolutionary War. This cemetery has 68 soldiers buried there, making it among the largest concentration of Revolutionary War soldiers buried anywhere. Post Families from Nutley 70 and Belleville 105 provided the Honor Guard.

# Fun With Flags - 48, 49, and 50 Stars



The authorized use of the forty-eight star American Flag was established on July 4, 1912, after the admission of New Mexico and Arizona to become our 47th and 48<sup>th</sup> states respectively. This authorized flag design was in place for 47 years until January 1959, the second-longest time this official flag design was in use.

The forty-nine star flag was used from January 1959 until July 4, 1960, after Alaska became a State.

When Hawaii became a state on July 4, 1960, the fifty star flag came into use. This design has been the longest design in use, for 64 years.

There is no law or provision of the Flag Code that prohibits the use or display of any previous authorized flag of the United States.









# O'Hare Airport, named for a Medal of Honor recipient, and the son of an organized crime figure!

Edward "Butch" O'Hare: The son of an organized crime figure is a World War Two hero and has Chicago airport named for him.


### Edward Henry "Butch" O'Hare

It has been said that Easy Eddie (Butch's father) didn't want his son to follow in his criminal activities, believing that his involvement in bringing Capone to justice would ensure his son being accepted to the US Naval Academy.

Butch O'Hare graduated from the Western Military Academy in 1932. The following year, he went on to the United States Naval Academy at Annapolis, Maryland. After he graduated and was commissioned as an ensign on June 3, 1937, he served two years on the battleship USS *New Mexico*. In 1939, he started flight training at NAS Pensacola in Florida, flying the Naval Aircraft Factory N3N-1 "Yellow Peril" and Stearman NS-1 biplane trainers, and later the advanced SNJ trainer. On the nimble Boeing F4B-4A, he trained in aerobatics as well as aerial gunnery. He also flew the SBU Corsair and the TBD Devastator.

In November 1939, his father was shot and killed, most likely by Al Capone's gunmen. During Capone's tax evasion trial in 1931 and 1932, O'Hare's father had provided incriminating evidence which helped finally put Capone away. There is speculation that this was done to ensure that Butch got into the Naval Academy, or to set a good example; it certainly at least partly involved an attempt to distance himself from Capone's activities. Whatever the motivation, the elder O'Hare was shot and killed while driving his car a week before Capone was released from incarceration.

Son Butch O'Hare later went on to a distinguished flying career. He was cited for downing five Japanese torpedo bombers while low on fuel and ammunition. He returned to his carrier, refueled, and took to the skies once again. He was shot down and his plane and his remains were never recovered.



### USS O'Hare

On January 27, 1945, the United States Navy named a Gearing-class destroyer DD/DDR 889 USS O'Hare in his honor. The ship was launched June 22, 1945, with his mother, Selma O'Hare, as the sponsor. *O'Hare* was decommissioned on October 31, 1973, then transferred on loan and later sold to the Spanish Navy. In 1992, the Spanish Navy decommissioned and scrapped the ship.

### **O'Hare International Airport**

Colonel Robert R. McCormick, publisher of the *Chicago Tribune*, suggested that the name of Chicago's Orchard Depot Airport be changed as a tribute to O'Hare. On September 19, 1949, the airport was renamed O'Hare International Airport to honor O'Hare's bravery. The airport displays a Grumman F4F-3 like the one flown during the Medal of Honor action.



# Medal of Honor Citation

Medal of Honor presentation on April 21, 1942: President Roosevelt, Frank Knox, Secretary of the Navy (behind FDR), Admiral Ernest King, Edward O'Hare and his wife Rita

For conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity in aerial combat, at grave risk of his life above and beyond the call of duty, as section leader and pilot of Fighting Squadron 3 on February 20, 1942. Having lost the assistance of his teammates, Lieutenant O'Hare interposed his fighter between his ship

and an advancing enemy formation of 9 attacking twin-engine heavy bombers. Without hesitation, alone and unaided, he repeatedly attacked this enemy formation, at close range in the face of intense combined machine gun and cannon fire. Despite this concentrated opposition, Lieutenant O'Hare, by his gallant and courageous action, his extremely skilful marksmanship in making the most of every shot of his limited amount of ammunition, shot down 5 enemy bombers and severely damaged a sixth before they reached the bomb release point. As a result of his gallant action—one of the most daring, if not the most daring, single action in the history of combat aviation—he undoubtedly saved his carrier from serious damage.

### Navy Cross Citation

The President of the United States of America takes pride in presenting the Navy Cross (Posthumously) to Lieutenant Commander Edward Henry "Butch" O'Hare (NSN: 0-78672), United States Navy, for extraordinary heroism in operations against the enemy while serving as Pilot of a carrier-based Navy Fighter Plane in Fighting Squadron TWO (VF-2), attached to the U.S.S. ENTERPRISE (CV-6), and deployed over Tarawa in the Gilbert Islands, in action against enemy Japanese forces on 26 November 1943. When warnings were received of the approach of a large force of Japanese torpedo bombers, Lieutenant Commander O'Hare volunteered to lead a fighter section of aircraft from his carrier, the first time such a mission had been attempted at night, in order to intercept the attackers. He fearlessly led his three-plane group into combat against a large formation of hostile aircraft and assisted in shooting down two Japanese airplanes and dispersed the remainder. Lieutenant Commander O'Hare's outstanding courage, daring airmanship and devotion to duty were in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Naval Service. He gallantly gave his life for his country.

### "Easy Eddie", the father

**Edward Joseph O'Hare** (September 5, 1893 – November 8, 1939), a.k.a. "Easy Eddie", was a lawyer in St. Louis and later in Chicago, where he began working with Al Capone, and later helped federal prosecutors convict Capone of tax evasion. In 1939, a week before Capone was released from Alcatraz, O'Hare was shot to death while driving. He was the father of Medal of Honor recipient Butch O'Hare, for whom O'Hare International Airport is named.

E.J. passed the Missouri bar exam in 1923 and joined a law firm. From 1925, O'Hare operated dog tracks in Chicago, Boston, and Miami. O'Hare, as a lawyer, represented the inventor Owen P. Smith, high commissioner of the International Greyhound Racing Association, who patented a mechanical running rabbit for use in dog racing. In 1930, his profitable work for Smith enabled O'Hare's family to move into a brand-new home in Holly Hills.

In Chicago, O'Hare met Al Capone, whose dominant Chicago Outfit ran Chicago rackets and bootlegging during Prohibition. O'Hare and Capone began collaborating in business and law. O'Hare made a second fortune through his ties to Capone.

But in 1930, O'Hare turned against Capone. He asked John Rogers, a reporter for the *St. Louis Post-Dispatch*, to arrange a meeting with the Internal Revenue Service (IRS), which was trying to convict Capone of tax evasion. Rogers organized a meeting with IRS agent Frank J. Wilson. O'Hare subsequently played a key role in Capone's prosecution and conviction. Agent Wilson was also Chief of the U.S. Secret Service between 1937 and 1946.

It is believed O'Hare directed investigator Wilson to the Capone bookkeeper who became a key witness at the 1931 trial, and also helped break the code used in the ledgers by Capone's bookkeepers. At the start of Capone's trial in the court of Judge James Wilkerson, O'Hare tipped the government that Capone had fixed the jury. Thus alerted, Judge Wilkerson switched juries with another federal trial before the Capone trial began.

Capone was found guilty and sent to prison in 1931.

The elder O'Hare was shot and killed on November 8, 1939, while driving his 1939 Lincoln-Zephyr coupe in Chicago. When he left his office at Sportsman's Park racetrack in Cicero, Illinois, in the afternoon, he was reportedly carrying a cleaned and oiled Spanish-made .32-caliber semi-automatic pistol, something unusual for him.

Two shotgun-wielding gunmen in a dark sedan drove alongside O'Hare as he approached the intersection of Ogden Avenue and Rockwell Street. Both fired a volley of big-game slugs, killing O'Hare instantly at the age of 46. His Lincoln crashed into a roadside post while the killers continued eastbound on Ogden Ave and were lost in traffic. No arrests were ever made.
