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

American Legion National Commander James A. LaCoursiere, Jr., issued the following statement today (30Dec2024) concerning the passing of former President Jimmy Carter:

"President Carter was a Legionnaire, a distinguished Navy veteran and a devout Christian. His commitment to human rights and community service was respected worldwide. He lived longer than any president in American history and made the most of his post-presidential years by strongly advocating for world peace and improving the lives of the disadvantaged. His energy, integrity and humility were admired by people across the political spectrum. President Carter's wife, Rosalynn, was a leader in mental health awareness. They will both be missed. Our condolences to the entire Carter family and the many lives that they have touched, especially in their home state of Georgia."

During an address to The American Legion's 1980 national convention, President Carter described his vision for America on the world stage. "We do not maintain our power in order to seize power from others. Our goal is to strengthen our own freedom and the freedom of others, to advance the dignity of the individual and the right of all people to justice, to a good life, and to a future secure from tyranny. In choosing our course in the world, America's strength serves American values," he said.

He was a Charter Life member of Sons of the American Legion, Bayonne (NJ) Squadron 19, Jim held many offices and was Past Squadron Commander, Past County Commander, Past Detachment Commander, Past National Vice Commander and Past National Chaplain. He was also the Past Director of the American Legion Riders of Bayonne Post 19.

Jim was an Ex-Chief and along with his wife Debbie, was one of the Founding Members of the Bayonne Fire Canteen, a volunteer rehab group serving the Bayonne Fire Department and surrounding departments.

He was Past President of the Knights of Fire Motorcycle Club. Jim also belonged to the Red Knights in Delaware.

Jim was a huge fan of the Dallas Cowboys and was known for always having a bottle of Diet Coke in hand! He also loved antique cars and enjoyed attending local car shows.

Jim lived his life in service to his community, his family, his friends and anyone in need.

An ongoing annual project of the New Jersey American Legion Family is to decorate the graves of Veterans in time for Memorial Day. This year, in the spirit of the *Flying Flags for Veterans* program, we ask that Posts, SAL, Units, and Riders keep a count of flags placed on graves. The flags usually come wrapped in bundles of twelve, in boxes of either one or two gross, so keeping count will be simple. Please keep track of the names of the cemeteries where flags were placed, and any additional help from groups such as ROTC, MAST, Boy and Girl Scouts, church groups, fraternal groups, and other Veterans Service Organizations that might be involved. When the job is done, please forward this information to njSALute@gmail.com to be included in a detailed report that will be submitted to media outlets.

A little history of *Flying Flags for Heroes*: In April of 2020, Sons of The American Legion Past National Commander Michael Fox, realized that our nation's heroes of the past don't get enough respect for their sacrifices, especially those laid to rest in local cemeteries. Michael joined forces with Preston Sharp and *Flying Flags for Heroes* was born. The challenge was to place a million flags throughout the US. The result was 1.6 million! *Flying Flags for Heroes* didn't end in 2020.

The Sons of the American Legion National Americanism Commission adopted ongoing support of *Flying Flags for Heroes* as an official program via S.A.L. Resolution X in the Spring of 2022. It is the goal of the Sons of The American Legion for the *Flying Flags for Heroes* program to help inspire true patriotism within our communities and help promote national pride in our country, its ensign, its military, and Veterans throughout the entire Legion Family.

One of the important things the American Legion supports is the repatriation of POWs, MIAs, and KIAs. The annual **Watchfire** in Seaside Heights is based on this. But have you ever wondered about the process? How it's done? Where do you even start to look for our missing? There's a book I read recently that explains the process, all the way back to the Civil War. It's called "Soldier Dead – How We Recover, Identify, Bury, & Honor Our Military Fallen" by Michael Sledge. Maybe a little drawn out in spots, but it explains in detail how this is accomplished. It isn't a pleasant subject, but it is fascinating nonetheless. I recommend it. Support for Homeless Veterans

The American Legion provides free guidance for veterans in need.

The American Legion places special priority on the issue of veteran homelessness. With veterans making up approximately 11 percent of our nation's total adult homeless population, there's plenty of reason to give the cause special concern.

To help our struggling brothers-in-arms, the Legion works on a global level, lobbying for legislation affecting veteran homelessness, and acts on a local level, directly assisting veterans who have fallen on tough times and are without a place to live or facing the prospect of it.

This direct assistance is coordinated by the Legion's Homeless Veterans Task Force, which works to ensure local services and resources are available to homeless veterans and their families. The Task Force, which has chairpersons in each department, collaborates with government agencies, homeless service providers and veterans service organizations to develop and implement initiatives that will help homeless veterans.

Additionally, Homeless Veterans Task Force chairpersons can provide direct aid to veterans and their families who reach out to them. A veteran who is homeless or facing possible homelessness can contact a chairperson, who will provide guidance and assistance to the veteran and his or her family.

The NJVAA (New Jersey Veterans Assistance Association) is proud to support The American Legion, The Foundation for Sustainable Veteran Housing, and REDCOM Design & Construction, in partnership for a ground breaking ceremony on a facility for at risk and low income veterans in Westfield.

Speakers included Shelley Brindle, Mayor of Westfield; Charles "Andy" Jackson, NJ Department Commander of The American Legion, as well as leadership from The American Legion Department of New Jersey Committee Chairman on Affordable Housing for Homeless and At-Risk Veterans, the Executive Director of the Foundation For Sustainable Veteran Housing, and leadership from REDCOM Design & Construction.

This building will house twenty-two at risk and homeless veterans. These facilities will be a new home for veterans complete with amenities, career services, mental health programs, and more to help at risk veterans sustain a more stable living situation.

Wreath placings in Washington DC are coming up with NJ Department Commander Andy Jackson. The national wreath laying is on 23-Feb. The NJ wreath laying is on 24-Feb.

Seventeen California SAL Members in California have lost everything in the recent fires.

NEC Bob Phillips (262) said forms are available at <u>mylegion.org/sons</u> for SAL Volunteer of the Year.

NJ Membership stands at 60% as of 15-Jan, the next target is 75% by 12-Feb.

There was a discussion of raising \$1 per Member for National candidate funding.

A Detachment dues increase will be coming along soon, raised by \$3 per member to cover rising expenses, to take effect after convention in 2026.

A gift auction fundraiser for the Detachment Commander Hodum's Project will take place at New Egypt Post 455 on 22-Feb.

NEF (National Emergency Fund) funds are desperately needed. Help is being extended to the Tennessee and North Carolina Legion Families after hurricanes Helene and Milton, and now assistance is needed in California. The Auxiliary also maintains an emergency fund as well. NEF Chair Dean Staknys (348) has collected over \$1800 from Ocean County, Sq 372, and general donations since May 2024 for NEF, including \$153 collected at the last meeting. Help is needed at the Watchfire in Seaside Heights on the third Saturday and Sunday 20-21-Sep, both financial and volunteer workers.

A CWF fundraiser will be held at Brick Post 348 on 11-Apr. The name of the organization has been changed from *Children's Welfare Fund* to the *Children's Well-Being Fund*.

COTA (Children's Organ Transplant Association) Chair Greg Shaffer (174) reported \$1386 in donations. PDC Carl Albern (346) made \$1 egg nog Jello shots for Neptune Post 346's annual Egg Nog Sunday and raised an additional \$45 for COTA.

PDC Nick Wingler (166) reported on the upcoming Special Olympics / Polar Bear Plunge on 22-Feb. He wants to raise \$2500 from the Legion Family toward the event in which he will join in the plunge into the ocean. The Special Olympics goal is to raise \$10,000 for the event.

PDC Matt Thalasinos (232) said that he has forms available for the Young Citizens Award. The candidates can be minors from the community, not just the Legion Family.

The next Atlantic City Stand-Down will be held on 20-21-May. Help is always needed for these events. The Stand-Downs are held on weekdays, which can be a problem for those who work.

The Consolidated Squadron Report (CSR) is perhaps the most critical document a squadron can complete. CSR information is combined with other squadrons in creating a final report used by The American Legion, forwarded to the U.S. Congress, and used to apply and verify awards at National Convention.

Not all squadrons participate in every program; leave those fields blank. The key is to report on the activities your squadron participated in from June 1st to May 31st.

All detachment/district/squadron donations and activities should be reported individually to your detachment adjutant. The CSR will require inputs, such as the number of veteran homes visited or volunteer hours contributed to a particular program. Other programs, such as The American Legion National Emergency Fund (NEF), enter the number of dollars donated or spent in whole numbers.

It is preferred CSR's are filled out and submitted online via myLegion.org. Squadron Adjutants and Commanders have access to complete and submit the entire form. CSRs are also available for download at legion.org/publications and legion.org/sons/

Please print out the form and complete each page by hand. Make sure it is legible and mail to the Detachment and retain a copy for the squadron's records. Check with your detachment for their deadline date; it may be different than the national deadline.

Detachments and districts should forward a copy by scanning and emailing their CSRs to CPRandCSRforms@legion.org or by USPS to the address below.

Detachment Reminder: July 1 is the final date for transmittal to National Headquarters for squadron reports to be included the national tabulation for awards at National Convention.



United States War Department General Order No. 57 - October 30th, 1895

GENERAL ORDERS,

HEADQUARTERS OF THE ARMY,

ADJUTANT GENERAL'S OFFICE,

Washington, October 30, 1895.

The following orders have been received from the War Department:

WAR DEPARTMENT, Washington, October 30, 1895.

By direction of the President, the fortifications at Sandy Hook, New York Harbor, will hereafter be known and designated as Fort Hancock, in honor of the late Major-General Winfield Scott Hancock, United States Army.

DANIEL S. LAMONT, Secretary of War.

"...the fortifications at Sandy Hook, New York Harbor, will hereafter be known and designated as Fort Hancock..."

We'd like to recognize one of the most important dates in the history of the Sandy Hook peninsula.

Since 1776, Sandy Hook had been the location of each continuing generation of American harbor defenses. The Proving Ground arrived in 1874, and the first modern concrete batteries were built in 1890-95.

As the Army continued to expand their presence and operations, it was recognized that the installation really didn't have an official name, and was known as "The Fortifications At Sandy Hook."

That all changed with War Department General Order No. 57 on October 30th, 1895, when Sandy Hook was officially, and permanently, named as "Fort Hancock," in honor of US Army Major General Winfield Scott Hancock, and hero of the American Civil War.

The trademark yellow-brick buildings would follow within the next two years.

Fort Hancock was to be one of the crown jewels of the burgeoning Coast Artillery service, and would grow to become the largest harbor defense fort on the East Coast.

Military History:

The defunct U.S. Army post Fort Hancock at the north end of the peninsula is open to visitation by the National Park Service. The Sandy Hook Proving Ground was used for many years—beginning after the Civil War until 1919, when the facility was moved to Aberdeen, Maryland—and was later the site of a Nike missile defense installation. The Sandy Hook Nike station is one of a very few stations that are still intact. Almost all of the fort's gun batteries are closed to the public due to their hazardous condition. The exceptions to this are Battery Potter and Battery Gunnison. Battery Potter is open frequently for tours on the weekends, as well as Battery Gunnison which is being restored by volunteers and has two six-inch (152 mm) M1900 guns installed; the weapons were placed there in 1976. Guided tours show visitors a Nike missile, the missile firing platforms, and a radar station with 1960s-era computers. A Civil War-era 20-inch Rodman gun is also in the park; this was an experimental gun that was the largest type produced by either side of that war.

North of Fort Hancock on the western part of the "hook" is an active station of the United States Coast Guard. This is one of the original Life Saving Stations built in 1848 at a site "on bay side, one-half mile south of point of Hook." The site was changed several times through the years due to a change in land or at the request of the War Department, which owned the land. [10] This area is administered by the Department of Homeland Security and is closed to the general public.

True Love Conquers All

"Captain, see this Eagle? I am a 'Full Bird' in the US Army Reserve, and on this is a 'Caduceus' which means I am a Nurse, with a surgical specialty, now, take me to your wounded!" He said, "Yes ma'am. Follow me."

"It was just before Thanksgiving '67 and we were ferrying dead and wounded from a large GRF west of Pleiku. We had run out of body bags by noon, so the Hook (CH-47 CHINOOK) was pretty rough in the back.

All of a sudden, we heard a 'take-charge' woman's voice in the rear.



There was the singer and actress, Martha Raye, with a SF (Special Forces) beret and jungle fatigues, with subdued markings, helping the wounded into the Chinook, and carrying the dead aboard. 'Maggie' had been visiting her SF 'heroes' out 'west'.

We took off, short of fuel, and headed to the USAF hospital pad at Pleiku.

As we all started unloading our sad pax's, a 'Smart Mouth' USAF Captain said to Martha,

"Ms Raye, with all these dead and wounded to process, there would not be time for your show!" "Captain, see this Eagle? I am a 'Full Bird' in the US Army Reserve, and on this is a 'Caduceus' which means I am a Nurse, with a surgical specialty, now, take me to your wounded!" He said, "Yes ma'am. Follow me."

Martha Raye's exemplary service to the Army - including trips to Vietnam to entertain the Green Berets - earned her a funeral here with full military honors.

The Special Forces soldiers called her "Col. Maggie." She said the Green Berets were like her sons, and some called her "Mom." She got her wish to be buried alongside them. She died on October 19, 1994.

Appreciation of her work with the USO during World War II and subsequent wars led to her being named both an Honorary Colonel in the U.S. Marines and an Honorary Lieutenant Colonel in the U.S. Army, and earned special consideration to be buried in Arlington National Cemetery. Upon her death it was instead requested that she be buried with Full Military Honors in the Fort Liberty (then Fort Bragg) Main Post cemetery at Spring Lake, North Carolina, home of her loving and beloved United States Army Special Forces; the Fifth Special Forces Group (Airborne) made her an honorary Green Beret for her USO work in Vietnam, including an unauthorized visit to the Leghorn, a top secret SOG listening post on a spire in Laos.



In December the film "Six Triple Eight" was released about the 6888th Battalion of African-American WAC (Women's Army Corps) soldiers put in charge of sorting out the mail backlog. In February 1946, the unit returned to the United States where it was disbanded at Fort Dix, New Jersey. There was no public recognition for their service at the time.





Bing Crosby and his USO Tours of WW2



When Bing Crosby's nephew asked him casually, late in Bing's life, about the most difficult moment of his career, he expected some juicy gossip about a difficult Hollywood director or the story of a struggle with a studio. But Bing instead told him it was on a USO tour in December of 1944 in an open-air field in France. He'd just made 15,000 French and American troops laugh and holler with Dinah Shore and The Andrews Sisters and now had to close the show with a quieter number: "White Christmas." He described having to maintain his composure and vocal control in front of 15,000 crying GIs as the toughest moment of his career.

He never wore his toupee on USO tours - a small thing, but he thought these occasions were above Hollywood artifice - and more importantly insisted that no officers or other top brass got front row seats. Front row seats belonged to enlisted men who were headed for the frontlines.

A few days after this performance of White Christmas his audience was sent to The Battle of the Bulge, one of the deadliest battles in the history of humanity.
